Read the following 2 books:

The Namesake by Jhumpa Lahiri (Be sure to read the novel and not watch the movie version) *How to Read Literature Like a Professor* by Thomas C. Foster

3 Part Assignment:

I. Read *How to Read Literature Like a Professor* by Thomas Foster, and write a two page typed double-spaced essay (12 pt font) in which you apply the analysis techniques discussed in the book to a movie you view this summer.

It can be any movie, but it should be one you have viewed this summer. You may choose to watch the movie with the specific purpose of writing this paper, so you don't miss anything. Avoid films which are adaptations of books and consider selecting a film which has been nominated for or received awards such as Academy Awards (less quality movies will yield less to analyze or write about).

II. Read *The Namesake* and *How to Read Literature Like a Professor* and annotate **both books** as follows. You will be turning in your books on the first day of class for a grade on your annotations. If you are unable to purchase the book and cannot write in

it as a result, you may use Post-It notes to fulfill this requirement. Your annotation will be graded based on completion and insightfulness.

What is annotation?

As you read, you are to underline, circle, and draw arrows connecting words and phrases, or whatever it takes to remind you later of your impressions. These annotations should include notes to yourself in the margins—

- asking questions anything you don't understand or wonder about the book
- making observations
- defining new vocabulary words
- noting allusions
- responding to emotional or intellectual issues
- use post-it notes to flag important pages/passages
- III. Maintain detailed notes as you read *the Namesake*. These notes will be in preparation for a detailed and comprehensive test in the first week of class. You will be expected to know a general summary of all the events recounted.
