Begin thinking about colleges and careers that fit well with your interests.</li> <li><input type="checkbox"/> Your high school counselors are great resources. Stay on track with your courses. The College and University Profiles tool at <a href="http://FloridaShines.org">FloridaShines.org</a> lists the admission requirements, deadlines, and other important information about each public college and university in Florida.</li> <li><input type="checkbox"/> Know the dates and locations of the SAT, ACT and other tests you might be planning to take, and put them on your calendar.</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li><input type="checkbox"/> Check requirements and deadlines for the colleges of your choice.</li> <li><input type="checkbox"/> Florida students: Complete your Florida Financial Aid Application (FFAA).</li> <li><input type="checkbox"/> Take the SAT and/or ACT.</li> <li><input type="checkbox"/> Ask references for letters of recommendation.</li> <li><input type="checkbox"/> Complete and submit all your college applications by their deadlines.</li> <li><input type="checkbox"/> Winter: Apply for Financial Aid. Submit your FAFSA (by the end of February) along with any other financial aid forms required by the college.</li> </ul>
