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Prevention Programs for the 2011-2012 School Year

Prevention education is an integral part of the education for our students. Through our efforts with prevention education we meet F.S. 1003.42(2)(n) and selected Next Generation Sunshine State Standard. Most importantly, we provide our students with the knowledge and skills they need to make good decisions to lead a healthy life.

Although funding for Title IV Part A, Safe and Drug-Free Schools has been eliminated, our goals for prevention education continue:

- To provide comprehensive substance abuse education with a focus on middle school.
- To ensure bullying prevention education (including Internet Safety) is integrated in the curriculum for grades K-12.
- To ensure Teen Dating Violence and Abuse prevention education is integrated in the curriculum for grades 7-12.
- To provide grades 3-12 with the opportunity to receive age appropriate education on alcohol, tobacco and other drugs.

Comprehensive Prevention Education - 6th grade focus

Because budget cuts have affected our community agencies, a comprehensive prevention program cannot be delivered by one agency in all our middle schools. Our county has the advantage of having multiple qualified agencies to provide prevention education to our students. Two comprehensive prevention programs available to our 6th grade students will be Stay on Track that is delivered by the National Guard and Drug & Alcohol Prevention Series For Middle School Education that is delivered by EPIC Community Services.

Stay on Track delivered by the National Guard – Middle School 6th GradeThe program will be delivered to 6th grade students. Modules for Stay on Track include Health Education (drug information), Decision-Making and Goal-Setting, Improving Communications Skills and Interpersonal Relations, and Media Influences. This program is delivered by a National Guard specialist in a classroom setting.

Drug & Alcohol Prevention Series For Middle School Education delivered by EPIC Community Services – 6th grade. Each lesson in this three part series is delivered during one class period.

Smoking Exposed

This program presents straight-forward facts about virtually every harmful effect that smoking can cause in an effort to get teens to stop considering smoking before they start. The program also exposes the new danger to teens of herbal cigarettes and bidis.

Alcohol Exposed

Using interviews and narration by peers, this program exposes the ways that alcohol use interferes with health, education and personal lives. Binge drinking is addressed as a real life danger and potentially lethal activity. Students learn the short-term and long-term effects alcohol can cause on the body and mind.

Marijuana Exposed

This program effectively dispels the myth, prevalent among many young people, that marijuana is not harmful because it is 'organic' and 'natural'. Through plain language narration by teen hosts and interviews with young people, marijuana is exposed as an illegal drug that damages the body as well as the mind. This program reveals the unhealthy effects and the very real dangers of marijuana use.

Introductory 5th Grade Prevention Presentation

Don't Drain Your Brain is a presentation on how alcohol damages the brain and is a good introductory presentation for 5th graders before they move to 6th grade where they will receive a comprehensive program. Bullying and Cyberbullying Prevention Education

F.S. 1006.147 and school district policy requires that bullying prevention education is integrated into the curriculum for grades K-12. Also, on June 2, 2011 H.B.251, which amends section 1003.42(2) F.S. was signed into law. This bill requires that public schools include the topic of Internet Safety in comprehensive health education. In 2010, Florida's Legislature amended Section 1003.42(2)(n) of the Florida Statutes to include a requirement for teen dating violence education to be incorporated into the health education curriculum for grades 7^{th} , 8^{th} , 9^{th} , 10^{th} , 11^{th} , and 12^{th} .

This program teaches leadership through army values of Loyalty, Duty, Respect, Selfless Service, Honor, Integrity and Personal Courage. Along with Army Values, it stresses skills like teamwork, communication and problem solving.

Program lessons can be delivered in one class period. The National Guard can present the program over five-days or a one-day blitz.

Suicide Prevention

School districts will provide all instructional and administrative personnel with access to educational resources regarding suicide prevention, which are approved by the Statewide Office for Suicide Prevention through the school district professional development plan under s.1012.98.

Guidance counselors have been trained to deliver suicide prevention education to teachers and other school personnel using the More Than Sad program. Online courses are also available for any school personnel. The course will give 2.0 inservice hours towards a teacher's professional development requirements.
